



This updated map shows 33 Temples and 6 sights which were described on the manuscript “Sekishu Ginzan Chikasato Junrei Engi - Kannon Reijō meguri” (Historical origin of Pilgrimage around Sekishu Ginzan Silver Mine - Pilgrimages to spiritual locations of Kannon Bodhisattva) written in Genroku 6 (1693). Some of the Temple buildings were lost due to natural disasters, and some of them have been preserved or recovered by villagers throughout these past 300 years. We hope that this map will help you experience glimpses of people’s beliefs in those days, and transformations in history. Pilgrimages were the origins of tourism in Japan, and we hope you experience element of leisure while visiting these 33 Temples. Please be cautions of falling rocks, insects and animals you might encounter on the way, and visit the sights at your own risk.

Numbers for the 33 Pilgrimage Temples were given in Genroku era, and are not according to current road conditions.
